We celebrated a pretty sweet year of philanthropy at our Annual Meeting & Celebration. And, we awarded \$229,000 in one night!

The night was a celebration of all the good things that happened over the past year: grantmaking to the tune of \$6.9 million, including \$368,000 in academic scholarships; handing out 3,000+ backpacks filled with school supplies at Backpacks For Good events in FOUR Berrien County locations; giving away more Senior Care Kits (900+!) than ever before to lowincome seniors citizens across the county; and the launch of Gotcha Doin' Good - a new way to recognize your friends and neighbors who are making our corner of the world a little bit better.

The major highlights of the night were announcing the winners of the **Alamar Nonprofit Sustainability Grant,** Carolyn's Kids grant, The Stephen E. **Upton Love Your Community Grant, Golden Acorn Volunteer Award and Golden Acorn Excellence Award!**

Standout Volunteerism

Every year at our **Annual Meeting & Celebration**, we recognize community members and nonprofits who go above and beyond what is anticipated in their roles.

Southwest Michigan Community Action Agency (SMCAA) was selected as the **2023 Golden Acorn Award for Excellence.** SMCAA stepped up to the plate when BCF had an unexpected need for a food provider for all four Backpacks For Good events.

They went above and beyond in providing food boxes to all 442 families who attended Backpacks For Good. They provided a standard food box and baking bag complete with flour, sugar and other baking items, as well as bringing a giant chest freezer so each family could go home with a frozen chicken.

Along with the recognition, SMCAA received a \$3,000 grant.

Called the "OG" of backpack event volunteers, Ulleg led the charge in connecting BCF staff with donors and community members when the event

launched a handful of years ago for the Coloma/Watervliet area. And every year, she volunteers in some capacity.

Bailey is the reason we were able to offer Backpacks For Good to Eau Claire students this year for the very first time. Bailey went around to community members and businesses to gather funding and the volunteers needed to make a great event!

Both Ulleg and Bailey will receive a \$1,000 grant to be directed to a nonprofit of their choice.

Food For Good Goal Met!

The **Food For Good** challenge launched by Berrien Community Foundation has met its goal to ensure mobile food pantries are fully funded in Berrien County!

Earlier this year, BCF extended a \$20,000 community challenge to meet the anticipated funding gap for **Feeding America West Michigan's** mobile food pantry program. Feeding America West Michigan Mobile Food Pantries (FAWM) provide weekly fresh food in neighborhoods throughout Berrien County. This year, because of increased food prices and supply chain issues, the organization anticipated a \$40,000 funding gap.

But that need has been met.

"It really was a community effort to rally around FAWM," said BCF President Lisa Cripps-Downey. "Gifts ranged from \$20 to a thousand or more — every cent counted, and everyone pitched in."

Conversations with FAWM and other local food pantries led the BCF team to create the **Food For Good Fund**. BCF already had the **Feeding Berrien** — **Terry N. & Maryfran Tieman Endowment Fund** that helped with this initiative. Terry & Maryfran Tieman had the foresight to set up an endowment to help with food needs in the community.
