

Tying It Together - with 310 Orchard

Berrien Community Foundation is partnering with **Deer Creek Open Space Association (DCOSA)** to conserve land in Sawyer. The goal is to raise \$240,000 to complete the project.

DCOSA purchased 310 Orchard Boulevard planning to tear down a dilapidated home, plant indigenous trees and flowers, and create a walking path. The property, called the Orchard Meadow Preserve, will link two nearby preservation projects together.

"This project meets our mission statement with protecting and conserving land," said DCOSA board member Bob Beemer. "We're promoting appreciation and education of our natural environment and trees."

"Being able to link two green spaces together with a community walking path is a project that will benefit so many in our community," said Berrien Community Foundation President Lisa Cripps-Downey.

Not Your Average Library Book

The **Lincoln Township Library** is a library of many books, but now they have expanded to offer some not-so-typical library items.

One of **Berrien Community Foundation's For Good Grants** was awarded to the Stevensville library to start a "library of things" — full of both everyday and uncommon household items ready to be checked out by patrons.

"Our 'library of things' will be full of things you don't typically see in a library — items people would use for everyday purposes at the house," Lincoln Township Library Director Joelle Wake said. "The 'library of things' is also a place for people who want to give a hobby a try without spending \$150."

The "library of things" is likely to include some technology gadgets, crafting machines, cooking appliances, tools and hobbyist items like a tent.

"We think of ourselves as more of a community center where people can see their neighbors, hang out, enjoy programming and get different items to bring home," said Wake.
