

Welcome, Pam & Elena!

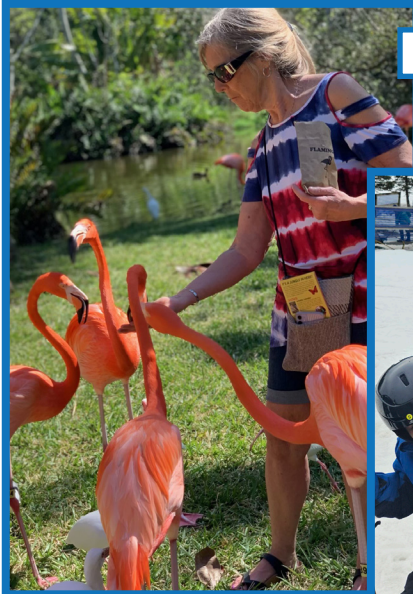
Pam Dolezan and Elena Rockette are the newest additions to the team at Berrien Community Foundation.

The 2023-2024 cohort of **Teens Exhibiting Able Minds (T.E.A.M.)** members has left a lasting imprint on Berrien County as they ended their year of philanthropy in June.

T.E.A.M. awarded **\$35,500 in For Good Grants** to six organizations and **\$5,000 in Golden Acorn Classroom Mini Grants** to support 15 classroom projects. Each member of the group also spent approximately 25 hours volunteering throughout the school year.

BCF Celebrates \$1 Million Grant to Create Park

Berrien Community Foundation's work with Benton Charter Township has landed a **\$1 million Michigan Department of Natural Resources Spark Grant** to create a fun, family-friendly recreational park in Benton Heights.

"This project was incredibly important to BCF for many reasons, but one of the biggest was to improve the quality of life of local residents," said Berrien Community Foundation President Lisa Cripps-Downey. "There currently are no public parks in Benton Heights but there are more than a thousand adults and children within walking distance."

Plans for the new park — which will be located near the intersection of Euclid and Laurel avenues behind the former Martindale Elementary School — will transform a vacant lot owned by the township into a 10-acre park. There will be a playground, pavilion, splash pad and a 3/4-mile walking trail winding through existing woods. There is also room to possibly expand to include other features such as sporting fields and courts.

The design and location of the park came directly from community input, which was gathered during several community events and through an online survey organized by a partnership between New Heights CCDA, Benton Charter Township and Berrien Community Foundation.

"We are so incredibly thankful for everyone who put time and effort into turning this dream into a reality,"

said Benton Charter Township Supervisor Cathy Yates, who has worked on the project for more than a year. "This new park is going to be the local go-to place for children and families alike to spend quality time outdoors, visit with neighbors, exercise and have fun."

The goal of the CMF/DNR Spark Grant Program partnership is to improve healthy spaces in communities experiencing significant levels of health, social and economic disparities. This grant is to help "opportunity communities" mitigate the effects from the COVID-19 pandemic, such as financial hardship and isolation.

BCF Awards Over A Half-Million Dollars in Scholarships

Berrien Community Foundation is sending out **more than a half-million dollars in scholarships** to college-bound students this fall.

“For the first time ever, we are sending more than half a million dollars out to students chasing their academic goals,” said BCF President Lisa Cripps-Downey. “That is \$500,000 in student loans that they collectively don’t have to worry about. It’s because of our wonderful and generous donors that we have reached this milestone.”

In total, **91 scholarships were awarded to 86 local students for a grand total of \$533,000.**

BCF offers scholarships for graduating high school seniors, students currently in college, adults returning to the classroom and students going into the trades.

Four new scholarships were added for the 2023-2024 school year – the **David and Kathleen Bradley Scholarship, Jon and Chenai Gillispie Trades Scholarship, New Futures Scholarship, and Ruth Ann and Louis Harvey Benton Harbor Youth HBCU Scholarship.**

“It’s because of families like the Bradleys, Gillispies and Harveys that we are able to say that, to date, Berrien Community Foundation has awarded more than \$4.3 million to local students,” said Berrien Community Foundation Program Director Susan Matheny. “There’s so much to experience at college or trade school. These scholarships allow students to learn and explore all that higher education has to offer.”

Where Are They Now?

Receiving a scholarship from Berrien Community Foundation was the confirmation Kate Rendell needed to know she was on the right track.

Rendell, who is now the executive director of Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of Southwest Michigan, remains thankful for receiving the **Dunn Scholarship** and **Upton Opportunity Scholarship** in 2019 when she restarted college.

“To be supported by an individual is one thing,” said Rendell. “But to be supported by a group of strangers who want to see change and improve people’s lives – it really gave me a lot of confidence and drive to continue on.”

Rendell’s past experience working with children in the foster care system broke her heart wide open and told her there was still more work that needed to be done.

CASA advocates for children in the foster care system. They dive deep into the child’s case and learn everything they can about the child’s life so they can be the best advocate possible for them when working with lawyers, social workers and the court.
