Garden fund sprouts from nurtured friendship

It was a friendship that blossomed into something wonderful.

When Judy Jones and Nicole Moon met, they became fast friends. Both were artists and had the vision to make the world a more beautiful place. One of their many accomplishments together was building and caring for the Benton Harbor Arts District Garden.

Judy and Nicole both died last year, barely three months apart, after battles with cancer. The legacy of the Benton Harbor Arts District Garden will live on through the Judy Jones & Nicole Moon Arts District Garden Support Fund at Berrien Community Foundation.

The fund was created by Judy's sons Aaron, Sam and Ben Jones, and is supported by friends and family of the dynamic duo who want to honor them and keep the garden going and growing. The fund will help purchase the supplies needed to care for the garden, which is located across the street from the old Turner Building (now Ben's Pretzels and apartments) and make sure it's thriving and beautiful.

It just makes sense that the lasting tribute to Judy and Nicole be in the Benton Harbor Arts District. They spent 15 years working in the garden to turn the old parking area into the beautiful space that passersby enjoy today. Judy was also instrumental in the launch of the Benton Harbor Arts District, envisioning a city being enhanced by the arts. Nicole was an

accomplished artist and an avid nature lover. The garden is a work of art that they created together.

"My mom and Nicole were best friends," Aaron said. "They did everything together. I think this garden just embodies their friendship and the love they had for each other and for the community."

The goal is to grow the fund into an endowment that will provide for the care of the garden in perpetuity. Members of the Benton Harbor Arts Association, friends and neighbors will continue to be an integral part of maintaining the garden with the same volunteer spirit and determination that Nicole and Judy exemplified.

Scholarship Raises Curtain On Higher Ed Pursuit

When Ella Harris thinks of **Berrien Community Foundation scholarships**, she thinks of hope.

"I'm so happy that, along with the scholarship I received, so many other people in Berrien County got to receive scholarships to help them in their education," said Harris. "These scholarships give people **hope.**"

Harris, a musical theater major at Lake Michigan College, received the **David A. Hicks Scholarship for the Arts** from Berrien Community Foundation in 2024.

"Being able to come to college and not really have to worry about how I'm going to pay for my books or tuition is definitely helpful," she said.

Harris juggles many responsibilities as a fulltime student and part-time employee while also being involved in the college's music and theater departments and performing in multiple shows a year.

"It's always been a dream of mine to go further in my education," Harris added. "This is the first step."

The scholarship Harris received was established by the family of David Hicks, a Lakeshore student who passed from cancer. David often spoke of pursuing a college degree in an art-related field because of the joy he found in animation, comics, superheroes, theater and video games, his family said.

"When we award this scholarship to deserving students like Ella who want to show the world their creativity, it feels like David's legacy is living on," said Zack East, David's brother. "It's as if his passion for the arts is now in the spirit of others ready to show the world their talents. We as a family couldn't be more proud of helping these students in David's

name every year."

The David A. Hicks Scholarship is one of more than 50 scholarship funds held by BCF.

"We are proud to be a leading organization donors can turn to for fulfilling their charitable plans," said BCF President Lisa Cripps-Downey. "Our donors make college more attainable for students while lifting up loved ones, organizations, fields of study and so much more."

In 2024, the Foundation awarded \$533,000 to 91 students. This means, collectively, they did not have to assume more than a half-million dollars in loans.

Berrien Community Foundation will celebrate the next cohort of scholars and their donors June 17 at its annual Scholarship Celebration.

Grant funds life-saving tools for Harbor Country fire department

Technology and equipment have come a long way over the last 20 years. Weesaw Fire Department experienced that every time they used their decades-old Jaws of Life to gnaw through the stronger metal used in newer vehicles.

Weesaw Township officials knew the fire department's rescue tools needed to be replaced, so they applied for and received the **William J. Deputy Grant** to help offset costs. The brand-new, lightweight and battery-operated tools allow crews to act more quickly without being tethered to fuel pumps or burdened by heavy machinery.

Nonprofit leaders learn scenario, advocacy planning

Berrien Community Foundation organized a series of workshops to equip local nonprofit leaders with new tools and knowledge to steady their organizations should shifting sands come their way.

BCF partnered with Corewell Health Foundation Southwest Michigan and United Way Southwest Michigan to offer two workshops to nonprofits, "Scenario Planning In A Changing Funding Landscape" and "Advocacy In a Complex Environment." Experts from the Dorothy A. Johnson Center for Philanthropy at Grand Valley State University led the sessions.

"As community funders, it is important for us to work together to meet needs," said BCF President Lisa Cripps Downey. "This time, meeting needs came in the form of workshops to learn, brainstorm and plan for how to navigate this new funding landscape."

The experts from the Johnson Center took participants through a hands-on exercise to strategically prepare for possible crises that could affect funding, sustainability and the existence of their organization. The advocacy workshop focused on how essential trust is and

the factors at play for effective advocacy.

"The event allowed us to spend several hours with like-minded community partners who are also struggling with potential funding challenges," said Caring Connections Chief Executive Officer Robin McGinnis. "The meeting was extremely helpful and thought-provoking."
