How do you engage students? Make learning creative and FUN! Ring Lardner Middle School art teacher Scott Morgan took that a step farther and started an after-school graphics club. Prior to being a teacher, Morgan was a professional graphic designer and photographer.

"I have entered my Art students in the Box Factory for the Arts every year," Morgan said. "It is the biggest Art show in the area. I noticed several middle schools in the area were entering computer generated artwork. So, last year I started the Graphic Design Club."

Grants from the Berrien Community Foundation helped to

Their first effort is to provide two FREE, three-hour workshops designed to help women enhance their mentor skills.

"The program was designed with the idea that women at all ages and stages in life are mentors," said WGC member Shari Weber. "This workshop will help them identify mentoring opportunities as well as have the tools needed to be the best mentor that they can be."

Partnering with the local YMCAs, the workshops will be held 11 a.m. - 2 p.m., on Tuesday, May 7 at the Niles-Buchanan YMCA. Lunch is provided and free childcare and transportation are offered to help women attend. The same program will be offered 5:30 - 8:30 p.m. on Monday, May 6 at the Benton Harbor/St. Joseph YMCA.

"The Mentoring Success workshop is just the beginning," said BCF President Lisa Cripps-Downey. "I look forward to what this amazing group of women will accomplish."



Passing Up A New Car To Start A Scholarship

What college student doesn't want a new car? Meet Callahan Stoub - founder of the Stoub Family Scholarship for Working **Students at the Berrien Community Foundation.**

Callahan's dad, Eric is a small business entrepreneur who recently sold part of a business and decided to take a portion of the proceeds to purchase better, more reliable cars for his kids. He and his wife Traci felt cars that could handle Michigan winters and last through college and beyond were good investments to make on behalf of their children. But Callahan - a history major at Hillsdale College - had something in mind that would last much longer and help students like herself handle the expenses of a college education.

dents." Practically speechless, Eric told her to put together a proposal and they would talk about it over Christmas break.

"Since I started thinking about careers in high school, I always had a list of places I want to give back to someday," Callahan said. "We always had jobs in high school. I would hear about my friends spending summers volunteering or traveling, which is great, but I really think I learned a lot from working."

One of the keys to the scholarship for Callahan is rewarding students who have a work history and a professional resume. "I think it is important to reward students who have had a job and the experience of working for college," she said.

The endowed scholarship will provide \$1,000 for a graduating high school senior or community college student starting at a four-year college. The student must show a three-year work history during school or the summer and demonstrate financial

need. The family would like to see the scholarship go to a student that is "caught in the middle," unable to receive need-based financial aid but also unable to afford the rising cost of college.
